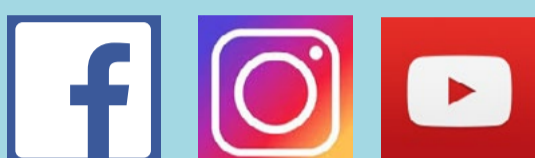

Fall 2018: Place Based Stewardship Education in Action!



Au Gres-Sims students ventured to Charity Island in Saginaw Bay to map endangered Pitcher's Thistle, track phragmites density and pull invasive spotted knapweed.



Ella White Elementary students got their feet wet before sampling for microplastics and surveying for invasive rusty crayfish and zebra mussels in the Thunder Bay River.
