LUNCHROOM WASTE



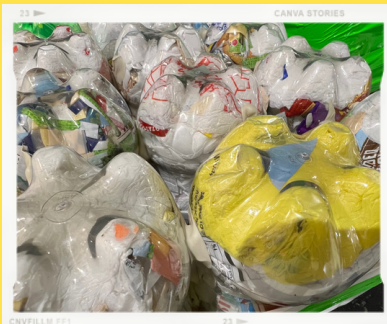
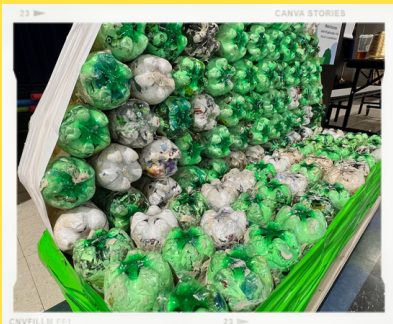

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

The 5th graders at Lincoln Elementary School looked for ways within their school to reduce marine debris. They quickly realized that lunchtime was the school's biggest trash generator and that roughly 130 styrofoam trays were being used each day! Since styrofoam is so light there is always the worry of it blowing away and ending up in local waters. This inspired the idea to reuse the lunchroom waste by creating ecobricks. Styrofoam and plastics collected in the lunchroom were torn into small pieces and stuffed into 2-liter bottles donated by Pepsi until solid. The class also did a trash clean-up at a local park to collect for the bricks. The bench now has a home in the school hallway!
